Prerequisites: MAT 331 and MAT/CIS 275.

Course Description: This course is a rigorous, proof-based treatment of linear algebra. We plan to cover much of Chapters 1–7 of the text and additional topics as time permits.

You will find this course completely different from MAT 331. There will be much more emphasis on developing proof-reading and proof-writing skills. In particular, there will be very few, if any, problems of the form “diagonalize this matrix” or “Compute...”. Problems will more typically begin “Prove that...”. Some of the concepts will be familiar from MAT 331, but some will be new. All the material will be in a more abstract environment.

Homework: Problem sets will be assigned each week, due generally on Thursdays. These homework assignments are crucial to your experience in the course. Working independently on them will probably help you to learn more effectively, and to do better on exams. However, you may work with others if you prefer; each student must write up their solutions completely independently.

You are always welcome — encouraged!! — come see me in office hours for help.

I will be grading on mathematical correctness, and also on the clarity and completeness of your presentation. No late homework will be accepted.

Grades: In addition to the homework assignments, your grade will be based on three midterm exams and a cumulative final exam. These five factors will determine your grade according to the following weights.

Midterm exams	50%
Homework	20%
Final exam	30%

The midterm exams will be given on or about the following dates:

- Exam 1: Thursday 24 September
- Exam 2: Thursday 22 October
- Exam 3: Thursday 19 November

The final exam will be given on Friday 18 December, 2:45–4:45pm. The location will be announced later in the semester. This is the only time the exam will be offered.
