

## MAT 531 – A Second Course in Linear Algebra - Spring 2009

**Text:** *Linear Algebra Done Right*, 2nd edition, by Sheldon Axler, Springer, 1997

**Prerequisites:** MAT 331 and MAT 275/CIS 275

**Course Description:** The main goal is to give a rigorous, proof-based treatment of linear algebra. We plan to cover much of Chapters 1–7 of the text, with some additional topics. You will find this course quite different from MAT 331. For one thing, there will be an emphasis on developing proof-writing skills. Some of the concepts will be familiar from MAT 331, but many will be new. The material here is developed in an abstract setting that makes it more easily adapted to different applications.

**Homework:** Homework problems will be assigned in class. Some problems will be designated for handing in and these will be graded. You may discuss the problems, but each student is required to write up independent solutions. It is important to develop the ability to write concise and complete proofs. Late homework will not be accepted.

**Quizzes:** There will be a short quiz at the end of class most Wednesdays. This will cover the material most recently presented in class. The intent is to help you keep up to date with the material. Most students will find quizzes a way to improve their grade in the course.

**Exams:** There will be two midterm exams and a final exam as follows:

Exam I:           Wednesday, February 18<sup>th</sup>, 2009  
Exam II:          Wednesday, April 1<sup>st</sup>, 2009  
Final Exam:     Tuesday, May 5, 2009 7:15-9:15pm

**Make-ups:** No make-ups will be given for quizzes or missed homework, but to allow for emergencies you may miss up to two quizzes and two homework assignments. Otherwise your two lowest scores for each will be dropped. There will be no make-up exams. A missed examination counts as a zero unless you present a valid excuse, for example a physician's note. With the excuse, you may use your score on the relevant portion of the final exam to replace the missed exam.
