INTRODUCTION TO ABSTRACT MATHEMATICS

Course Description: This course teaches you how to think logically and rigorously. It will change the way you read and analyze statements, and the way you construct arguments. And for those of you considering a major in mathematics, you will for the first time see mathematics as mathematicians do: not as a tool but as a rich and beautiful subject. All of this will be accomplished largely by studying how to read and write mathematical proofs.

The course will broadly follow the assigned text, but the lecture notes will form the main body of material. They are at least as important as the text book. For this reason it will be very hard to catch up if you miss class. If you do miss a class, you will need to get the notes from another student, as I will not be providing notes for lectures that are missed.

The emphasis of the course is mastery of the material and methods rather than covering a specific list of topics. Thus there is no set daily schedule for the course. We will proceed at the necessary pace to master the essential ideas. The work you do for the course will include solving problems and writing proofs of claims.

Mathematics Requirements: MAT 295 must be successfully completed, or you must obtain my permission.

Text: *Passage to Abstract Mathematics*, by Mark E. Watkins and Jeffrey L. Meyer, Addison-Wesley.

Calculator: A calculator is not necessary for this course.

Course Format: The course meets two times per week, every Monday and Wednesday.

Final Examination: The final exam is comprehensive. Your final examination will take place on Friday, 16th December. The time and location will be announced in class during the semester. You are required to take the final examination during the appointed examination block and, in the absence of an exam conflict, at the scheduled time.
