Course Description: This is the first course in a two-course graduate sequence. The topics covered will come from linear algebra and group theory.

Homework: Homework will be assigned in class. Some problems will be assigned to be turned in and graded. You are encouraged to work together to solve the problems, but each person must submit their own writeup. Writing mathematics is an important skill to acquire and will be taken into consideration in the grading. Your solutions should be clear, concise, and complete. If something is obvious or trivial, you should say so, but be sure you aren't ignoring the crux of the problem.

Exams: There will be one midterm exam during the semester, probably on Oct. 17, and a two-hour final exam in Exam Block 14 (Thursday Dec 12, 12:45pm–2:45pm).

Grading: Your grade will be based on homework, the midterm exam, and the final exam, equally weighted.
