Solving the homework problems is crucial for your success! Homework is assigned approximately weekly. Homework is due as you enter class. There are no make-up assignments. Homework will be graded based on my selection of one or two representative, randomly selected, problems (depending on the length of the assignment).

Quizzes will be held approximately weekly. There are no make-up quizzes. The two lowest quiz scores will be dropped.

Rescoring of Homework, Quizzes and Exams:
