Course Description: The topics include modules, submodules, factor modules, chain conditions, Hilbert basis theorem, division rings, Schur's lemma, Jacobson density theorem, semisimple modules, socles, Jacobson radical, semiprimitive rings, Artin-Wedderburn theorem, composition length, Jordan-Holder theorem, projective, injective and divisible modules, projective and injective resolutions, integral extensions, completions, localization.

Text: *Advanced Modern Algebra* 2nd Edition, by Joseph J. Rotman, AMS 2010.

Mathematics Prerequisites: MAT 631, 632.

Homework: Problems will be assigned in class and some of these will be collected and graded. You are encouraged to work with your classmates on problems, but each student must write up an independent solution. The criteria for grading solutions will be explained in class.

Exams: There will be one two-hour exam (on a date to be announced) around the middle of the semester. In addition there will be a two-hour final exam at the end of the semester.

Grades: Homework will count for 55% of your grade, the midterm will count 20% and the final will count for the remaining 25%.

Under the policy, students found in violation are subject to grade sanctions determined by the course instructor and non-grade sanctions determined by the School or College where the course is offered as described in the Violation and Sanction Classification Rubric. SU students are required to read an online summary of the University's academic integrity expectations and provide an electronic signature agreeing to abide by them twice a year during pre-term check-in on MySlice.

The Violation and Sanction Classification Rubric establishes recommended guidelines for the determination of grade penalties by faculty and instructors, while also giving them discretion to select the grade penalty they believe most suitable, including course failure, regardless of violation level.
