Textbook: Introduction to Scientific Computing: A Matrix-Vector Approach Using MATLAB, 2nd Edition, by Charles Van Loan.

Course Description: Approximation methods for solution of nonlinear equations. Interpolation problems. Numerical integration. Solution of ordinary differential equations. Other numerical methods. Error analysis. Programming in MATLAB.

Calculator policy: You are allowed to use a scientific calculator on homework, quizzes, and exams. You still need to show work to receive any credit. You are not allowed to use a more sophisticated calculator such as a graphing calculator.

Programming language: MATLAB. Please make sure that you will have access to a computer with MATLAB installed on it. For example, you can use the computers in the lab located on the second floor of the Carnegie building. It is likely that there are other options on campus.

Programming is an essential part of the course. It is NOT optional. Your final grade will depend on both your understanding of numerical methods and your programming skill.

Written homework: A written assignment will be posted on Blackboard after each lecture. It is due at the beginning of the next lecture. There are 20 sets of written assignments. Each is worth 5 points.

Programming assignment: A programming assignment will be posted on Blackboard every Friday. Your MATLAB codes should be submitted to Blackboard in a single zip file before 11:59pm on the following Thursday. There are 10 sets of programming assignments. Each is worth 10 points.

Quiz: There will be a quiz at the beginning of each lecture. It will cover previous lectures and may have a programming component (i.e., you may be asked to write a MATLAB program on paper). There are 20 quizzes. Each is worth 5 points.

Mid-term exam: There will be two in-class mid-term exams: one on Tuesday, October 2nd and the other on Thursday, November 8th. Each exam is worth 100 points and includes a programming component.

Final exam: The final exam will be given from 5:15pm to 7:15pm on Wednesday, December 12th in Carnegie 100. The final exam is worth 100 points and includes a programming component.

There will be no make-ups for homework, quizzes, or exams unless you have a truly exceptional excuse.

Mark your calendar now: mid-term exams on Tuesday, October 2nd and Thursday, November 8th, and final exam on Wednesday, December 12th.

Grading Policy: Total points possible is 600 = 100 (written assignments) + 100 (programming assignments) + 100 (quizzes) + 200 (mid-term exams) + 100 (final exam). A letter grade will be assigned based on the percentage of points that you earn: 93% to 100% → A, 90% to 93% → A-, 87% to 90% → B+, 83% to 87% → B, 80% to 83% → B-, 77% to 80% → C+, 73% to 77% → C, 70% to 73% → C-, 60% to 70% → D, below 60% → F.
