Course Description: This is the second course in a two-semester introductory graduate sequence. The topics covered will come from ring theory (including factorization and module theory) and field theory (including Galois theory).

Chapter 13	Field Theory	definitions and examples; algebraic and transcendental extensions; straightedge and compass constructions; algebraic closures and separability
Chapter 14	Galois Theory	the Fundamental Theorem of Galois Theory and applications; finite fields; insolubility of the quintic
