Course Description: MAT 296 is the second course in a three-semester sequence in Calculus. This sequence is designed for mathematics, science, and engineering majors and for those students in other majors who intend to take more advanced courses in Mathematics. This course covers techniques of integration, applications of integration in a variety of contexts, exponential growth and decay, improper integrals, parametric curves in the plane, polar coordinates, sequences and series (including power series, Taylor and Maclaurin series), this are chapters 6,7,8,9 on the text.

Course restriction and Prerequisites: Completing MAT 295 (Calculus I) with a grade of C- or better is a prerequisite for MAT 296 (Calculus II). If you have not satisfied this prerequisite, you must drop MAT 296 and register for MAT 295 . Students who earned a C or less in MAT 295 are at great risk in MAT 296. For these students it is important to review material from earlier courses, especially as it comes up again. At the same time, it is also vital not to fall behind with the current material. Students who have scored a 4 or 5 on the Advanced Placement Calculus BC exam cannot receive both AP credit and credit for MAT 296.

Calculators and Cell phones: A calculator is not required for this course. If you would like to use a calculator, a TI84 or TI-83 is recommended. The use of a calculator will not be allowed during quizzes and exams. All electronic devices other than the calculator should be turned off and put away during class.

Course Supervisor: Please inform your **instructor** of any problems that you have with this course. Problems not satisfactorily resolved with

Class Attendance and Participation: This is a Summer session course so that each class is equivalent to roughly two Fall semester classes. It is then essential to your success in this course that you attend each lecture and participate in the discussions. Therefore, you are expected to attend each lecture and to show up on time. Should you need to miss a class for any reason, you are to contact the instructor in a timely manner. Reasons for missing lecture must be documentable, especially if we have a quiz, and presented if requested. You are responsible for any material covered during the lecture as well as any work assigned during the lecture.

Schedule: Schedule is tentative and would be added to blackboard. The goal of the course is to start reviewing section 5.5 and continue from that until section 9.4.

Homework and Quizzes: Homework will be given daily, but it will not be collected. There are going to be quizzes two times a week mostly Tuesdays and Thursdays at the final 15 minutes of the lecture. Quizzes are going to be based on homework and material given in lecture.

Tests: There will be two exams, each accounting for 25% of your final grade. There will be no makeup tests and quizzes. However, for excused absences, the corresponding portion of the final exam will be used in place of the missing test score. The final exam is comprehensive and accounts for 30% of the final grade.

Exams Policy: Two 1.30-hour exams will be given on the following dates

- Exam 2: Thursday 21 June 2018.

No make-up exams will be given.

Final Exam Policy: The final exam will cover everything and will be given in 29th June 2018 from 12 to 2 pm.
