

MAT 521, INTRODUCTION TO PROBABILITY AND STATISTICS
Summer Semester 2018

Course Description: Algebra of sets. Probability in finite sample spaces. Binomial and multinomial coefficients. Random variables. Expected value and standard deviation. Density functions. Statistical applications.

Text: *Introduction to Probability*, by Blitzstein and Hwang, ISBN-13: 9781-4665-75578. The material covered in this course appears in Chapters 1 thru 8, and chapter 10.

Mathematics Prerequisite: MAT 397.

Grading: Grades for the course will be based on the total number of points accumulated on two mid-term exams, the final examination and a combination of homework and/or quizzes. The mid-term exams will each count 25%, homework/quizzes 25% and the final exam 25% toward your grade. There will be no make-ups exams. If you miss an exam for a valid reason, the corresponding portion of the final will be used to make up the missing score.

Exams: The tentative mid-term dates June 6 and June 22 and the final exam will be on June 29.

Quiz: Starting from the second day of classes, there will be a quiz almost every lecture except on the days of the exams. The topics covered in the quiz will be announced in the previous lecture. There will be no make-up quizzes. The lowest (one) quiz score will be dropped.

Homework: Homework will be via the online portal:
